Great Cressingham Litter Pickers

At the beginning of this year, myself & my wife Donna decided to do our bit for the community and do some litter picking around our village of Great Cressingham. Litter seems to be an endemic problem within society all over the world these days and anything we can do to help reduce it can only make our world a better place. We quickly realised that spending a few hours litter picking wasn't going to scratch the surface of it though. I put some feelers out on our village Facebook page for a few extra helpers and was quite frankly amazed by the response from other passionate villagers all keen to give up their time to make a difference to the village we all call home. I quickly had a group of around 15 wonderful people, some of whom already did some litter picking.

As mentioned by the "Editor" in the previous edition of Signpost, Breckland Council are keen to support community litter picking projects and can under normal circumstances supply equipment to use. But unfortunately, due to the pandemic and keeping all equipment sanitized, they are currently unable to supply equipment. They do however supply us with green bin bags for our use that they will collect from a central location. So I approached our local Parish Council for funding and with thanks to them, we were soon armed with litter pickers, gloves, hi-viz vests and bag hoops. So we set a date in January and went picking.

We decided to make our litter picking a monthly event to try and keep on top of it, as we found that it very quickly, often literally within a few hours, begins to return. At the time of writing this, we have had 3 litter picking weekends now and between us we have to date managed to collect 162 bags of litter, just from within Great Cressingham and have reported numerous sites of Fly-Tipping with things such as Sofa's, Fridges, around 15 car tyres, car batteries and loads of general builders waste, that have all been removed. Once you go looking for it, it's quite frankly shocking how much there is laying around the verges and under the hedges. It's also incredible how long some of this litter has been laying around

for. I'm sure we've all seen in the media that plastics & tin cans etc. can take decades, hundreds, even thousands of years to decompose. To prove it, my wife found 2 tin cans under a hedge. One can, albeit a bit battered, has a best before date of Dec '92 making it 29 years old and the other can, with an older style of ring pull, was in near perfect condition and I have been able to date it back to the mid 1980's, meaning this can has been laying as litter under a hedge for at least 35 years, and apart from the print being a little faded, the can showed no sign of decomposing whatsoever.

Several of our litter picking group are so keen that we go out litter picking in between our organised monthly picks, Unfortunately there is no shortage of litter to be found. I would highly encourage other local communities to organise group litter picking events, if you don't already do so. You will be helping to save the environment, protect wildlife, give something back to your community and make the world a better place. What's not to like?

For help, I would suggest contacting Breckland Council at Environmental.Services@breckland.gov.uk or maybe speak to your local Parish Council for support. You can report Fly-Tipping via the Breckland Council website and from experience, they usually remove it within a day or so... so thanks very much to Breckland Council for this. There are also some great Apps to report Fly-Tipping such as ClearWaste and FixMyStreet. If you'd like to help, you can contact me through the Great Cressingham Facebook page, or contact Hannah Scott (Parish Clerk) and she can put you in contact with me.

Some courses and meetings are still held via zoom, but there are some gatherings returning to a modified normality. As the local police message said when restrictions were relaxed in early April, let us enjoy our new freedoms, but do so responsibly. We must remember that no interaction is risk free, and keep up our efforts.

It is quite exciting to see local pubs and coffee shops serving customers in outside spaces. I drove past two pubs on the day after they re-opened and was aware of the air of celebration as people gathered together at a safe distance, for the first time in months.

Schools, too, are open, and the children are enjoying being back together and being with their teachers, although they are operating under restrictions.

A very happy, celebratory wedding was held at Cockley Cley at the end of April, and many people are making enquiries about future wedding dates. There are many couples who have had to postpone weddings planned for 2020, and their joy at being able to go ahead is great.

We have become aware of how much we need social interaction. Some things can be done alone, but almost every activity is better shared with friends and family. We are made to be social beings.

As we begin to gather again, inevitably we will be reminded that some of our friends and loved ones are not with us. We need to be sensitive and supportive towards those who have suffered personal losses.

In general, people are considerate and responsible and we can look forward to a bright future, by the grace of God.

FROM OUR MP

It has been a very busy Spring and with the positive move to ease COVID restrictions, the hospitality industry is once again opening up great to join other diners enjoying the sunshine at Brown's Cafe, Mundford and the Bedingfeld Arms, Oxborough. Students have been back in the classroom for a number of weeks now and more and more staff are returning to the office, I am therefore very pleased to see that Norfolk County Council has secured £700,000 to pilot a Rural Mobility Fund in the Swaffham area and surrounding villages. I supported the bid and working with Norfolk County Councillor Ed Colman highlighted the need to address rural transport issues. Some villages only have a bus service once a week with students struggling to take part in after school clubs, attend further education or maintain a part-time job. The elderly may feel isolated and can struggle to access medical provision due to a lack of available transportation. This funding is extremely welcome and will be a real boost to our rural communities with many areas planning events for the summer. I popped into the White Hart Pub in Swaffham to discuss with landlords Kurt and Laura Oliver their plans for the coming months, both are keen to attract visitors to the town and offer residents activities during the school holidays.

Also very positive news is that the government's commitment for thousands more police officers across England and Wales is well on target with 109 new recruits in Norfolk. Everyone appreciates the value of local policing and the relationships that are built with communities. More police on the streets, fighting crime and protecting the vulnerable are what the public want and the new officers in the county will be a tremendous boost to Norfolk Constabulary.

The UK is a nation of animal lovers and was the first country in the world to pass legislation to protect animals in 1822, and we have achieved remarkable things in this area ever since. However, we want to go further, setting new higher ambitions which continue the tradition of protecting animals in the UK and abroad. The government has set out its Action Plan for Animal Welfare for this Parliament and beyond. The key proposals as follows:

Sentience and Enforcement

Landmark Sentience Bill will recognise and enshrine animal sentience in law, and will create an expert committee on animal sentience to report on government decisions, holding Ministers accountable to Parliament for animal welfare in policy making, in a targeted and proportionate way. In

addition support for more legislation to improve enforcement – such as the use of penalty notices.

International Trade and Advocacy

Ensure our high animal welfare standards are not compromised and use the UK's position as a global leader for international advocacy on animal welfare. Legislation will be introduced to ban the import of hunting trophies from endangered animals broad, to ban the import and export of detached shark fins, and to stop the advertising and sale here of unacceptable animal attractions abroad.

Farm Animals

As part of protecting and enhancing the welfare of farm animals bring an end to the export of live animals for slaughter and fattening. The government will support livestock farmers financially via the 'Animal Health and Welfare Pathway'. Further reforms in this area include introducing effective powers to tackle 'livestock worrying' and considering other improvements to welfare on the farm.

Pets and Sporting Animals

Bring forward legislation to tackle the trade in puppy smuggling and introduce compulsory cat microchipping. Cross-Government taskforce will crack down on pet theft and will also take forward wider reforms such as the licensing of animal sanctuaries, as well as consider improvements for racing greyhounds and for equine identification.

Wild Animals

Keeping primates as pets will be prohibited by law, and the government will consider further legislation for a close season for hares whilst cracking down on the illegal practice of hare coursing. Will improve standards for zoos, including in relation to their conservation activities.

The coronavirus outbreak has underlined the importance of animals in our lives. From the companionship provided by our pets, to the importance of a secure food supply chain founded upon high-welfare farming, to conserving and protecting wild animals, animal welfare has never been more important. Now we have left the EU and our Transition Period has ended we have the opportunity to go further than ever in protecting our animals. In areas that were previously under the jurisdiction of EU law we can now more freely make our own reforms and fulfil our manifesto commitments on animal welfare.

A TOMB FIT FOR A KING by Peggy-Dorothea Smith

St. John the Evangelist in Oxborough contains a startling sight for an English parish church, a pair of Italian Renaissance-style terracotta tombs. Built for the Bedingfeld family c1520 – c1535 they are not completely unique in England, for there are at least six others, all in East Anglia, but the Bedingfeld tombs are the finest example you will see outside of continental Europe. Little is factually known about them, in some cases it is not even certain who their occupants are, but with a bit of detective work I have managed to piece together some of their story, and if it wasn't for Michelangelo's broken nose, they might very well not have been here at all!

When Henry VIII came to the throne in 1509, he was eager to show that he was as sophisticated and grand as any European king, he was also a great Italophile. Shortly after his accession, the celebrated Italian sculptor Pietro Torrigiano arrived at court, he had been banished from Florence for breaking Michelangelo's nose in an altercation and had been wandering Europe creating masterpieces for various rulers. Henry VIII commissioned him to create some magnificent terracotta busts and to build the grandest tomb and altar England had ever seen, to house the remains of his parents, Henry VII and Elizabeth of York. This great Italian-style monument began a trend amongst Henry's courtiers. Cardinal Wolsey commissioned another renowned Florentine, Giovanni da Maiano, to decorate Hampton Court with terracotta elements, and to design him an even more elaborate tomb than that of Henry VII. Meanwhile, Henry VIII was planning his own tomb with Torrigiano.

Henry's courtiers were desperate for the new Italian look and England was soon flooded with Italian artists to fulfil this demand. Layer Marney in Essex was one such house that employed terracotta workers to enhance its red brick construction. Sadly, the 1st Baron Marney died before his house was completed, and his heir shortly after him — Sir Edmund Bedingfeld happened to be married to Lord Marney's daughter, Grace. Sir Edmund's parents, Sir Edmund and Lady Margaret, had died some years earlier,

leaving instructions for a chapel to be built as their place of rest, alongside the Parish Church at Oxborough. The younger Sir Edmund was also an executor of the Marney wills, and it seems it was he who commissioned terracotta tombs to be constructed for both his parents and the Marneys. The designs on all the surviving tombs show they were created by the same workshop, though It is impossible to say who they were made by, for they left no signatures, only their fingerprints in the clay. They may have been built by English workers who had picked up the skills from the Italians, though I feel that with a flood of itinerate Italian terracotta workers in the country, there would have been many looking for employment once the larger projects were finished. Intended to reflect the grandeur of Henry VII's tomb, these cheaper terracotta extravaganzas would have been skilfully painted and gilded. The Bedingfeld tombs would have originally been adorned with effigies of their occupants, as can still be seen on the Layer Marney tombs. The other tombs that survive can all be found in Norfolk, and my research shows that all their occupants had family connections or associations with the Bedingfelds.

By the 1530s Henry VIII had famously fallen out of love with all things Italian. It is possible that there were more Tudor terracotta tombs built, but protestant fervour encouraged the destruction of such catholic showiness, and there is evidence of some being reduced to fragments, it is a miracle that these few have survived for us to marvel at today.

Whilst researching this article I was interested to discover that upon Cardinal Wolsey's demise Henry VIII requisitioned the cardinal's tomb, putting his own design aside as Wolsey's was far grander. The tomb was in kit form, a great black sarcophagus to surmount a richly decorated altar. This knowledge astounded me, for it is well known that Henry VIII's body lies in St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, untombed. Apparently, none of Henry's children cared enough to have the tomb constructed and it lay in the bowels of Windsor for generations. The Commonwealth sold off whatever was of value, leaving the black marble sarcophagus almost forgotten. In 1805 George III found a good use for it, he felt it was a sarcophagus fit for a hero and presented it to entomb the

body of Norfolk's own Horatio Viscount Nelson. So, thanks to Michelangelo's broken nose, the Bedingfelds and Lord Nelson lay at rest in tombs fit for a king.

Wow..... haven't things been mad since I last wrote? Hasn't it been difficult to figure out what you can and cannot do as far as Covid regulations are concerned? Especially if you intended to fly off to sunnier climes in June. Trying to figure out if the traffic light system affects your foreign travel arrangements is a nightmare, what with extra testing there and back, possibly self-isolating for 10 days on your return. It makes you wonder if it's all worth it doesn't it?

We're opening our B&B on the 17th May and we are jumping through hoops to make sure we're ready.

We've decided it's prudent at this time to only let one room per night. It's going to make the sanitising a lot easier. We've almost forgotten how to run the business, what with getting up most mornings at 6.00am to prepare for breakfasts. That's going to be hard.

Our next job over the weekend before opening is the big swimming pool clean up and getting it up to heat, just in case anyone is mad enough to want a swim, considering the weather we've had.

Hasn't it been cold and really rubbish weather...? Full sunshine and 4-6 degrees. Even the dogs have taken one look at the weather and turned around and gone back to their beds. Can't say I blame them.

The NoMowMay thing has been hard to obey as the lawns look so unkempt and scruffy. Hopefully the bees have made the most of it. At the time of writing this we are being swamped with those pesky St. Mark's flies that hover lazily around and destroy the lawns with their larvae, eating the grass roots!

Also we have a healthy family of rats in the garden under one of the many sheds. I put a humane trap out for them with a good, old dollop of peanut butter inside and yet they managed to consume it without getting caught. Too clever for us mere mortals!

We decided to re-clad one of the sheds and inside curled up were 7 baby voles. We gently re-located them and they were

happily scurrying around no worse the wear. So I didn't feel too guilty.

Little Cressingham

A MAN WORRIED BY A DONKEY. — An old man named Girling. Aged 80 years, employed on the Threxton Farm of J.T. Millis, Esq., as a shepherd has met with a very serious accident. He was proceeding home to Great Cressingham, when in the road, known as Green Lane, he slipped and fell. The donkey he had led fell upon him, and the reins becoming entangled the animal began to worry the old man. One of his ears was nearly bitten off, his face very much scratched, and he was otherwise injured. Some men at a distance hearing the old man's cries, ran to his assistance, succeeded in extracting him from his perilous condition, and took him home. He now lies in a precarious condition.


Norfolk Chronicle 27 August 1904

An alarming report was circulated on Tuesday that had occurred in the parish of Little Cressingham. near Swaffham. It was ascertained that a man and woman, accompanied by three children, arrived from Bradford on the 12th inst., and stayed in a cottage belonging a labourer. One of the children shortly afterwards developed symptoms which were diagnosed by the assistant to a neighbouring doctor to be those of small pox. The local authorities appear to have acted with commendable promptitude in dealing with the case. The child was at once removed to the Isolation Hospital. The cottage at which the outbreak occurred was put in quarantine, measures were taken to disinfect the premises, and, in fact, everything was done to prevent the spread of the disease. Owing to these precautions there is perhaps little likelihood of further outbreak: and what also tells in favour of this view is the fact that the cottage wherein the disease was first observed is itself sufficiently isolated to be practically out of harm's way. Further, there is the reassuring knowledge that Swaffham is a comparatively well vaccinated district: consequently the chances are strongly against any extensive spread of infection. There is nothing to indicate that the disease originated at Cressingham; in all probability it was one of those imported cases which are occasionally reported. But wherever it had its origin, it only shows how necessary it is to be constantly prepared to cope with small-pox; and in this case the authorities are entitled the highest praise for the manner in which they have acted.

Nov 1904

SWAFFHAM: A meeting of the Joint Isolation Hospital Committee was held on Monday, presided over by Mr. Young. Dr. Foster reported that, in conjunction with Dr. Allen, he had given certificates of fitness to leave to the patients, and that the cottage at Little Cressingham had been thoroughly disinfected. The Medical Officers' bill for attendance during the outbreak was produced, amounting to £48.17s; and the bill for the nurses £42.5s.9d.
